
Our approach is transdisciplinary, and fosters synergies between arts, science, traditional ecological knowledge, and new technologies.


This implies inspiring and empowering many humans to transform the way we think, work and live, through transformative learning, and by embodying values of connection, reciprocity, and care.



## Learning Planet Festival Workshop

During the Learning Planet festival, One Resilient Earth organized an online dialogue to share the experience of the 'Facing Climate Colonialism' workshop at the UN, in collaboration with theater artists Alois Reinhardt, Komi Togbonou and environmentalist Marion Atieno Osieyo.

## Becoming Climate Artists

In collaboration with Climate Creativity and with Erasmus+ support, we designed and facilitated Becoming Climate Artists—an online journey co-created by young adults for young adults to reimagine climate action through arts, creativity, and community. The program empowered over 460 participants, and 230+ members remain active in our online community for continued learning and support.

## Live Climate Circle at TAK in Berlin

We hosted a series of in-person Climate Circle at Theater Aufbau Kreuzberg (TAK) in Berlin, creating a safe and supportive space for participants to share their emotions about climate change. This gathering fostered deep listening and open sharing, strengthening community connections in the face of the climate crisis.

## A series of online Climate Circles across the globe

Diverse hosts facilitated online Climate Circles throughout 2024, offering a safe and inclusive space for sharing climate stories and community support. Climate Circles foster emotional expression, community connection, and inspiration. The circles received an average rating of 9.42/10.

## CLARITY - Transformative Climate Resilience Education


In collaboration with Lund University, Legacy17, Climate Creativity, REAL School Budapest, and thevisionworks, and with Erasmus+ support, we co-developed a policy brief and a green competences framework, to help teachers and educators support children and youth in shifting from climate anxiety to wellbeing, resilience, creativity, and regeneration.



May

## Discussing Climate Change and Mental Health in Canada

We partnered with the Environmental Studies Association of Canada to organize a keynote and workshop focused on climate emotions at their annual conference at McGill University. Our Climate Circle session, led by Autumn Trainor, provided a space for participants to openly share their stories of injustice, exhaustion, frustration, grief, joy, and hope.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF 2024

## Green Culture Festival in Potsdam

At the Green Culture Festival in Potsdam Sanssouci Park (Germany), Jakob Wondra and Laureline Simon shared insights from our Creative Europe project, a Festival's Deep-dive into Climate Resilience, engaging participants in creative exercises to explore climate emotions and cultivate emotional wellbeing in times of deep societal transformation.



June

## Youth Climate Circles

From June, we organized online Youth Climate Circles, a dedicated space for young people to nurture their emotional and mental wellbeing while engaging in climate action. Hosted by Hanna Schoening Jertz, Isabelle Drury, and Myrina Gkolesi, these weekly, youth-led circles reached a global audience and fostered connection, emotional wellbeing, and openness.



June - December

## Creative Lab Networking Meeting

In collaboration with the Master's program "Transformation" at the Technical University of Applied Sciences Würzburg-Schweinfurt, we hosted a dialogue as part of their Creative Lab. Held at the Summer Pavilion, students explored cultural and creative industry projects, and received insights from Laureline Simon on climate resilience.



June - September

# HIGHLIGHTS OF 2024

## Climate Circle Host Training programme

We facilitated online Climate Circle host training programmes, equipping 90+ participants with skills to create safe, supportive spaces for people to process climate-related emotions. The training emphasized deep listening, mutual respect, and community building. Participants valued the programme's community-focused mission and its potential to foster resilience and regeneration.



June- October

## Deloitte's Better Futures Day

As part of Deloitte's Better Future Day, Laureline Simon delivered a keynote on Emotional Wellbeing in a Changing Climate, followed by a Futures Literacy workshop. Incorporating performances by Komi Mizrajim Togbonou and contributions of Sunniva Ferri, the workshop expanded participants' imagination around sustainability and challenged assumptions hindering climate action.



September

## Futures Literacy and the Arts for Transformative Climate Action

In collaboration with the UNESCO Chair at Hanze University of Applied Sciences, we delivered a certified, interactive 3-day online course on Futures Literacy, combining futures thinking and arts to explore climate resilience and regeneration. Participants, including 17 students and sustainability professionals, explored the future of planetary wellbeing through dialogues and practical tools for future thinking.



September

# HIGHLIGHTS OF 2024

## Exploring the futures of territorial care at a Sustainability Sciences Symposium

At the Sciences Symposium in Lille, France, organized by Future Earth, CNRS, IRD, and Université de Lille, we co-hosted a Futures Literacy workshop on the future of territorial care, focusing on territories affected by mining. Bringing together 30 researchers and practitioners, we facilitated discussions on sustainable living, alternative socioeconomic models, and protecting ecosystems.



October

## Monsters Circles! at the Becoming Monster Festival

We hosted Monsters Circles — participatory spaces to explore the emotional experience of transformation in a world of climate instability — at the Becoming Monster Festival, organized by The Emergence Network. Events took place in Berlin and online, welcoming participants to express their evolving identities through storytelling, performance, and deep listening.



October

## Lessons Learned from 'Co-creating transformative climate resilience with artists' at Berlin Science Week

During Berlin Science Week's Art & Science Conference at Holzmarkt25, Laureline Simon and Jakob Wondra presented on 'co-creating transformative climate resilience with artists', exploring how the arts can make climate science more accessible and drive cultural shifts for systemic resilience. A Q&A session encouraged further dialogue on how arts and science drive systemic transformation.

## THE SHIFT Corporate Climate Adaptation Conference



We supported Fauna & Flora, an international nature conservation NGO, in strengthening emotional wellbeing and co-regulation among their global teams. Through a climate circle host training programme and targeted workshops, participants gained tools to navigate eco-anxiety and emotional distress arising from confronting the ecological crisis daily.

# I. TRANSFORMATIVE LEARNING JOURNEYS

## CLARITY: Transformative Climate Resilience Education for Children and Youth

The CLARITY project, co-funded by the Erasmus+, is a collaborative initiative aimed at **equipping educators with the tools to address climate anxiety and nurture resilience, creativity, and regeneration in children and youth.**

The project is co-led by Lund University, One Resilient Earth, Legacy17, Climate Creativity, REAL School Budapest, and The Vision Works, with associated partners including the Learning Planet Institute and Hanze University of Applied Sciences.

In 2024, the CLARITY project engaged in an extensive co-design and co-creation process involving literature reviews, surveys, and consultations with 100+ educators. This led to the development of an adapted GreenComp Framework for children and youth, which provides guidance on integrating

sustainability competencies with climate resilience education. The framework is available in eight languages and has informed a policy brief advocating for transformative climate education, targeting policymakers and school curricula developers.

## CLARITY: Transformative Climate Resilience Education for Children and Youth – continued

In addition, we developed a draft Transformative Climate Resilience Education Toolbox, with a total of 20 multi-activity toolcards, designed to help educators implement a trauma-informed approach to teaching climate resilience. This toolbox, which will be translated into five languages, helps build the skills of young learners to shift from climate anxiety to resilience and regeneration.

As part of the project, **CLARITY has built an engaged community of educators and stakeholders across Europe**, with a growing list of participants eager to co-design and pilot the toolbox. The project's online resource hub and community platform further facilitate knowledge exchange and support the broader integration of regenerative educational practices.

As we continue to develop and implement these resources, we welcome educators and stakeholders to join us in shaping the future of climate resilience education.

## Becoming Climate Artists: A Learning Journey in Art and Activism

With the support of the Erasmus+ programme, One Resilient Earth and Climate Creativity launched 'Becoming Climate Artists,' an innovative online learning journey designed to **empower young adults to use the arts as a tool for climate activism and resilience**. The journey ran from January to April 2024, welcoming over 460 registered participants, providing a safe and inspiring space for young people to explore activism, rethink activism, and foster community care in the face of the climate crisis.

Throughout the learning journey, participants engaged in eight interactive online workshops featuring practitioners, scientists, artists, and storytellers who shared practical tools and methods for leveraging the arts in climate action.

Notable speakers included Tori Tsui, Joshua Konkankoh, Sarah Queblatin, Meera Dasgupta, Iselin Shumba, Amy Franceschini, and the Hot Poets.

The sessions covered topics such as the role of arts in climate activism, storytelling for climate action, and creative strategies to shift perspectives and facilitate systemic transformation.

Additional support from the LIONE association enabled the provision of mentoring to selected participants, and more in-depth impact assessment.

## Becoming Climate Artivists: A Learning Journey in Art and Activism – continued

### OUTCOMES

Impact assessment surveys conducted before and after the journey demonstrated significant growth in participants' motivation and ability to take climate action through the arts.

The program's emphasis on self-care, community support, and artistic expression helped young people navigate climate anxiety while inspiring collective action.

**The overall high rating (8.83 out of 10) for the workshops underscores the success of the program in meeting educational and experiential goals, with the content resonating well with participants.**

On the online community platform, 'We Are One Resilient Earth,' 234 active members continue to exchange insights, collaborate on

projects, and reflect on their experiences. Even after the program's completion, the educational materials and recorded workshops remain accessible to a broad audience. Interested individuals can still join the learning community, explore available resources, and take part in future learning opportunities.

## Climate Circle Host Training Programme

One Resilient Earth continued fostering emotional wellbeing amidst climate chaos by offering participatory, online training sessions for individuals interested in becoming Climate Circle Hosts. **The training equips participants with the skills and understanding needed to hold safe, supportive spaces where people can share the emotional impacts of the climate and ecological crises.** During the training, participants learn how to facilitate peer-to-peer support with presence and humility, while gaining access to learning resources through One Resilient Earth’s online community.

The online training programme attracted over 90 participants, many of whom were young adults or members of marginalized communities. Feedback from participants highlighted the training as enlightening, practical, accessible, and transformative, with many noting a renewed capacity to support emotional wellbeing within their communities. As one participant said: “I believe that the mission is profound and yet simple - to inspire and empower people to become resilient to climate change impacts, so we can learn and work together to regenerate communities and ecosystems.”

## Futures Literacy & Arts for Transformative Climate Action

In September 2024, One Resilient Earth partnered with the UNESCO Chair on Futures Literacy at Hanze University of Applied Sciences to **deliver a certified online course on fostering transformative action in response to the climate emergency.** This interactive twelve-hour course helped participants deepen their ability to anticipate and creatively respond to the climate crisis.

Designed for students, early-career professionals, and individuals working in the sustainability sector, the course brought together a small, diverse group for a participatory learning experience.

Through a Futures Literacy Lab, integrating multimedia arts, participants explored different climate scenarios, learned to embrace emergence, and experimented with using art as a catalyst for systemic transformation.

**Participants consistently emphasized the accessibility, depth, high-quality facilitation, and transformative nature of the learning experience.** Many highlighted the value of learning how imagination and future thinking can support present-day climate action. The tools and exercises were seen as effective in making abstract concepts practical and in opening up meaningful dialogue across regions and disciplines.



## II. IMPACTFUL EVENTS



### Deloitte's Better Futures Day

As part of Deloitte's Better Futures Day in Berlin, One Resilient Earth delivered a dynamic contribution to the event's exploration of sustainability, emotional wellbeing, and future-oriented action. The day began with a keynote by Laureline Simon on Emotional Wellbeing in a Changing Climate, followed by a co-designed Futures Literacy workshop facilitated by One Resilient Earth and enriched through live performances by Komi Mizrajim Togbonou (Deutsches Theater Berlin) and Sunniva Ferri.

**The workshop invited participants to expand their imagination around the future of sustainability work, challenge limiting assumptions, and engage more deeply with the emotional and systemic dimensions of climate change.** Through experiential learning and collective reflection, participants explored new perspectives on what sustainable futures could look like.

## Fostering Emotional Wellbeing with Fauna and Flora

From November to December, One Resilient Earth partnered with Fauna & Flora, an international nature conservation charity based in the UK, to support the emotional wellbeing of their global team. We offered a tailored training programme focused on emotional resilience, and co-regulation, followed by a climate circle host training. **We worked with staff members across various regions to strengthen their capacity to navigate the emotional toll of the ecological crisis,** while supporting their teams on the ground.

## Berlin Science Week 2025

As part of the first Art & Science Conference of Berlin Science Week 2024, One Resilient Earth hosted a session titled Co-creating Transformative Climate Resilience with Artists, **exploring how artistic practices can support inner change and cultural shifts toward long-term climate resilience.** The event was held at Holzmarkt 25 in Berlin and brought together over 50 participants, including scientists, artists, educators, and change-makers.

Laureline Simon spoke on how integrating arts and climate science helps make complex concepts like transformative resilience more accessible and engaging to young people, sustainability professionals, and at-risk communities.



Drawing from our international portfolio, the session illustrated the critical role of artistic practices in catalyzing inner change, cultural shifts, and systemic transformation. The presentation was followed by a dynamic Q&A session with Jakob Wondra and Laureline Simon, encouraging an open exchange on the promises and pitfalls of bridging science and the arts for climate action.

# III. LONG TERM IMPACTS OF PROJECTS

## 1. A Festivals' Deep Dive Into Climate Resilience

The core team of Fluctuations took part in 'A Festivals Deep-Dive into Climate Resilience', and were selected for one-on-one coaching sessions in 2023. Here is their feedback on the impact of their collaboration with One Resilient Earth:

“With our project Fluctuations, a festival along rivers, using the power of art, culture, collective action and joy to drive change within ourselves and within society, we had the pleasure and chance to be coached by One Resilient Earth.

We had the coaching at the very beginning of the project, and it really helped us to shape our vision. Indeed we worked on the design of the project, on the storytelling, on our values and manifesto.

**It opened our mind, allowed us to be more inclusive in the formats of the festival we want(ed) to shape, but also in the words we use.**

Thanks to the coaching, our message and way of communicating to others and to the world about Fluctuations was clearer, and it helped us kick off our project. We then successfully completed our first edition in 2024 in Lille, Brussels, Utrecht and Budapest with 4 festivals engaging communities through music, panels, workshops, and more to create the society of tomorrow already today.”

## 2. Re-Storying Landscapes in a Changing Climate

The project 'Re-Storying Landscapes in a Changing Climate' was implemented in collaboration with Living Story Landscapes and Hawkwood Center for Future Thinking, in 2022-2023.

The Re-Storying project engaged artists, culture bearers, and ecologists from the Philippines and the United Kingdom in a learning journey and exchange online and a residency in the UK. Its goal was to explore how artists and culture bearers can shape new narratives in response to the climate crisis. The project produced beautiful artworks, fruitful exchanges and a guidance document to support artists, community leaders and practitioners who wish to work with the arts and culture in fostering deep resilience and ecosystem regeneration.

**Re-Storying also gave birth to a legacy project called Restore - Restory, which explores ways in which the arts and science can complement each other in documenting climate loss and damage in the Philippines and beyond.**

The project began as a collaboration with the University of the Philippines Cebu and stakeholders of Cebu City after super typhoon Rai. Currently, Living Story Landscapes is engaging Indigenous peoples and territories within bioregions that hold biocultural heritage in the Philippines and other parts of the world.



## 2. Re-Storying Landscapes in a Changing Climate

Moreover, Zoë Svendsen, a theatre-maker who participated in the Re-Storying project reported that:

“In February 2023 I participated in the ‘Re-Storying’ residency with One Resilient Earth at Hawkwood Centre for Future Thinking.

As a theatre maker with 15+ years of experience making theatre that explores questions of how to live, in relation to climate crisis and capitalism, I have both participated in, and run, many workshops, panel discussions, and labs. The Re-Storying project, of all of these experiences, was the most transformative. **Gentle and full of care (at a time when I myself happened to be on the verge of burnout, professionally and personally), yet also willing to address the toughest, knottiest aspects of climate crisis, it was**

**utterly transformative for me, for my theatre practice, and my relationship to climate care.**

Bringing together artists of many disciplines from the Philippines and the UK, we were encouraged to share, experiment and breathe together. The tools shared in the lab have become core to my practice: deepening methods I had been already working with for some time, and introducing new perspectives.

**It’s now 2.5 years later and I still draw much from the energy and resilience-building of that one week with One Resilient Earth -** and have further shared my interpretation of those tools with other practitioners, including using them to design a climate conference for 300+ theatre directors at the National Theatre (London) in September 2023.”




